There are many trending topics on twitter, the followings are the topics found and discussed by this study.

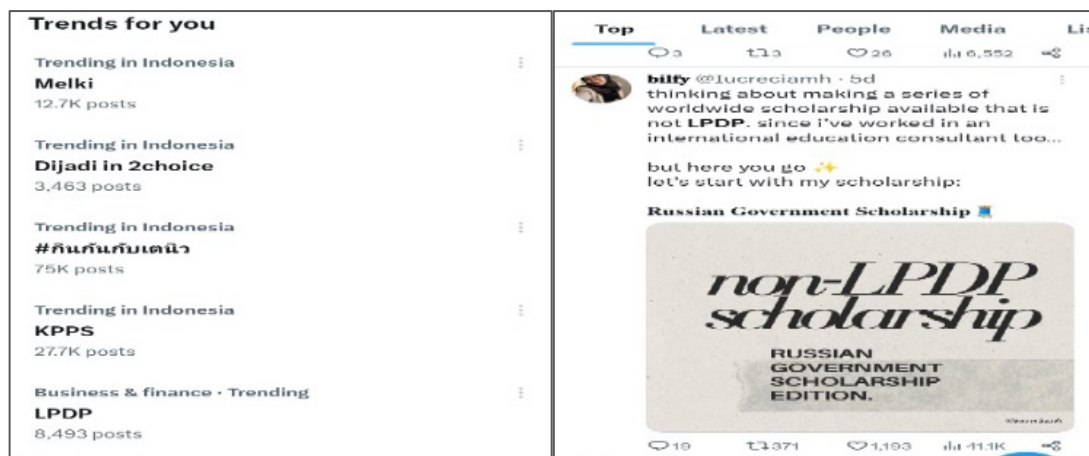


Figure 1. Trending topics on Twitter

widely discussed by Twitter users within a specific time frame. This allows Twitter users to quickly see what is currently being widely discussed on the platform.

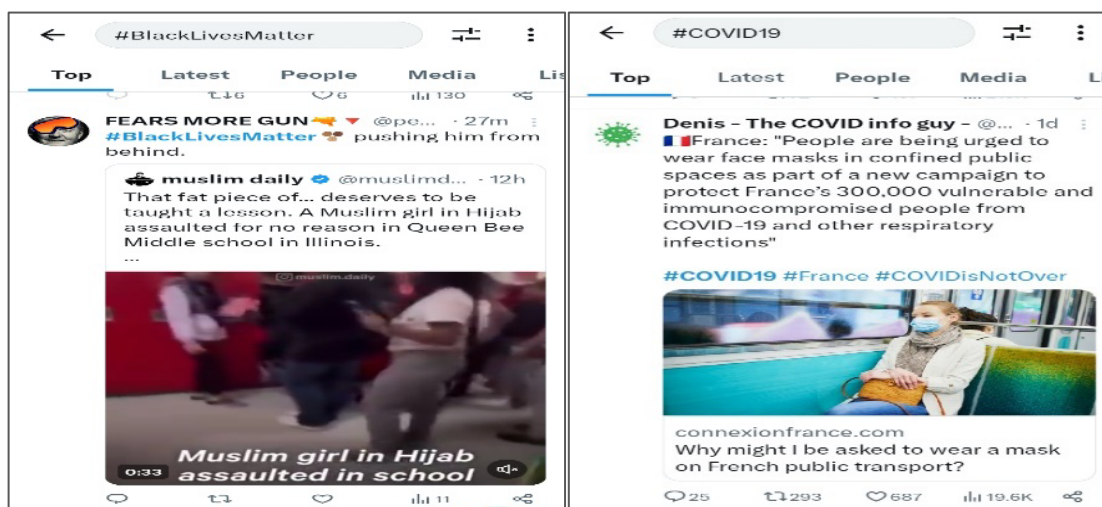


Figure 2. Worldwide hashtags
